

Book Title Pictionary

Don't panic over your artistic talents—remember this is just like Pictionary, except with a bookish twist. Stick figures, doodles, and symbols are most welcome! Instead of drawing words, you will be drawing book titles.

How to play:

Write down as many titles from books as you can think of—if you need some inspiration, have a look at Goodreads! Fold the pieces of paper in half and place them in a bowl.

Divide your group into 2 teams, and let the games begin!

A person from the first team picks a piece of paper and tries to draw the book title on a large piece of paper or a whiteboard. Whiteboards are so much fun as everyone can watch and sometimes, you will look back and be astounded that your team guessed the title from your doodles.

Each team has a minute or two to guess the book title (more than 2 minutes is usually far too long).

Now, it's the second team's turn.

Teams score a point for correctly guessing the title, and whichever team has the most points at the end of the titles in the bowl, is the winner.

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Historical Facts and Fiction of The Prodigal Son

Assassination of John F Kennedy (Dallas Texas 1963)

On November 22, 1963, the President of the United States, John F Kennedy, was assassinated at Dealey Plaza in Dallas Texas. At the time, Lee Harvey Oswald was arrested as the lone gunman.

Before he could go to court or testify, Oswald was gunned down, while in police custody, by mobster Jack Ruby. There is much speculation over whether events stated in the official record are accurate. Many claim it could have been anybody, from the Mafia to the Cubans and Russians, or to the US government itself.

What is known, is that the official files have never been released and the term *conspiracy* theory was born out of the conjecture of that event.

Battle of Hastings (East Sussex, England, AD 1066)

In AD 1066, the Battle of Hastings, between the Normans-led by William Duke of Normandy and the English-led by Anglo-Saxon King Harold, was a turning point in British and European history. There is much debate about the historical facts of the day, with much of it gleaned from the iconic Bayeaux Tapestry.

What is not in dispute is the Norman victory and the rule of England by William the Conqueror (Guillaume in French). All of the characters in the chapter are real individuals. Eventually, each of the major players on the Norman side were given lands by William, and he built the Tower of London.

Launch of the 1st Crusade (Clermont, France, AD 1095)

More than one thousand years after the Siege of Masada, the Holy Lands were under the control of Islamic Rule. At the Council of Clermont, Pope Urban II commanded the ruling heads of Europe to take back the lands in the Middle East.

The characters in the chapter are all real and according to documents, most attended that meeting. Shortly after, the Crusades began.

It was a small leap to incorporate the search into the story, for the remaining coins by the Pope's crusaders.

The Templars

Many myths and facts surround the Templars. Cultural stories have grown to epic proportions in literature, and in Hollywood. Founded during Pope Urban II's First Crusade, the Templars grew into an authoritative military and economic force. They are said to have amassed tremendous wealth and power with untold treasures.

In 1305 Pope Clement and King Phillip IV of France conspired to destroy the Templars and steal their treasures. Their Grand Master, Jacques de Molay was burned at the stake, but their treasures were never found. Some say they were secreted away to caves beneath Royston, England.

The Hospitallers

Much like the Templars, The Hospitallers left the Holy Lands after the Crusades. They set up their base in Rhodes and Malta, and also commanded great wealth and treasures. They eventually became the Order of St. John and competed with the Templars for wealth and prestige.

I used them as a fictional branch of The Order, whose role was to protect the coins.

Background of JFK's assassination (1959-1963)

When leaving office in 1959, President Dwight D Eisenhower had an historic and little-known exit speech in which he warned the US of hidden forces controlling governments. Between him and JFK, they met with most of the heads of state from around the globe. Many were secret meetings.

I used that as a backdrop expressing the need to remove the influential coins from the secret cabal running governments. It also allowed me to give credence to the assassination motives of JFK and the rise of his replacement, Lyndon Johnson.

From a planning perspective: I create a character bio, answering some standard questions about traits, hobbies, thoughts, vital statistics, etc. I then map out a general day planner for each major character to establish their habits, relative to the story.

From a writing perspective: Approximately the same time every day, coffee in hand, I head to the office, and put in my earphones. I turn on the music and type. Music seems to bring out the creative juices.

Who is your favorite writer?

When I was younger, Stephen King. I read a lot of horror. When I owned my book store, I learned to appreciate a breadth of writers. So do I have a favorite? No.

Which authors do I read a lot of besides King?

James Rollins and James Patterson. Michael Connelly and Wilbur Smith. Thomas Harris and Dean Koontz. These are my favorite fiction writers. I enjoy the gritty, believable stories they write.

How do you balance making demands on the reader with taking care of the reader?


